You may be aware that I have been away for the past two days at the Independent Association of Prep Schools' annual Heads' Conference in London. It was my first time at the event, and although it was somewhat daunting initially to walk into a conference room with around 500 other Head Teachers, many of whom know each other well, it has been a thought provoking time and a time to make some great new friendships as well as to get to know the Heads of some of the schools local to us a little better. Our sessions included grappling with the question of how best to support the mental health of prep school children and considering how we can harness the power of artificial intelligence to help all children to thrive – all important issues to think about in our rapidly changing world.

On Thursday evening I also had the delight of attending the IAPS Annual Conference Service at St Margaret's Church, Westminster Abbey. It was particularly notable how many Choir Schools' Association Heads were present for the service. The singing was wonderful and it was a stunning setting. Several of the Heads of non choir schools commented on how special it was, and it made me reflect that a beautiful choral Evensong is something that I experience almost every week at the Mother Church of the Worldwide Anglican Communion, and what a privilege it is to be present.

Thank you to all those of you who lent your children to us to help at Open Morning this morning. I really believe that our children are the best possible ambassadors for us, and my thoughts were certainly echoed by our visitors this morning. They make me so proud!

If that wasn't rewarding enough by itself, we were shortly joined by another "old boy" David Knowles. He was immediately recognised by John, who informed him that they had had lockers next door to each other in Wagner House in the Senior School, and it transpired that they had been pretty good friends whilst they were at school. Strangely, although they have lived within a few miles of each other for many years, they had not seen each other since leaving St Edmund's. We quickly opened the prosecco to toast their reunion and left them chatting away to each other in the St Edmund's tent when we returned to school! I asked their permission to share their encounter with you all in this week's newsletter, and I have promised to send them both a copy and invite them back to school for a visit.
