Dear Parents and Guardians,

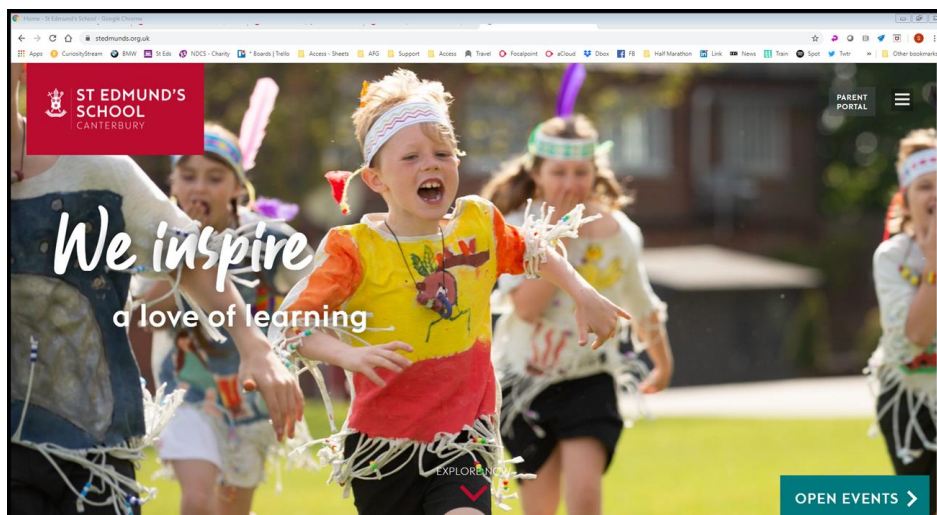
This week has certainly been a very busy first week back at school. In fact, half term seems little more than a distant memory! I do hope that you all had some lovely time away from school with your families. This week, the Junior School has been buzzing this week with everything from pumpkin soup making in Form 3 on Wednesday, to the launch of our new school website and even welcoming a class of local school pupils to join us for our Year 5 Experience Day on Friday. The Year 5 Experience Day was open to children who are currently in Year 5 at other local schools and who are considering St Edmund's for their secondary education from Year 7. This was the first time that we have run such an event, and we were delighted that it was oversubscribed. The children who attended came from 12 different local schools, and I think it would be fair to say that they all had a wonderful day. Every child gave us 10/10 as they left! Our Form 8 House Captains were absolutely fabulous role models, as were our two "Hospitality Hosts" Charlie Bond and Tom Blunt (F8) who have taken on that special role as part of the Seniorship programme. As well as ensuring that the children got to the right place at the right time, they also helped them to navigate their way around the multitude of menu choices at lunchtime before Charlie, Tom and Mr McKean took the children on a tour of the school site. A number of the House Captains also excelled themselves by welcoming the Form 5 pupils' parents back to school at the end of the afternoon.

I was pleased to have the opportunity to go to the Cathedral on Wednesday afternoon to bid farewell to Commodore Martin Atherton, the Receiver General who is leaving his role to take on a new post as Secretary to the Corporation of Trinity House, which is the General Lighthouse Authority for England and Wales, following three years at the Cathedral. Martin has worked closely with the school to support the needs of the choristers and I have enjoyed getting to know him and working with him. We all wish him every success in his new role and have encouraged him to keep in touch. Our Chairman of Governors Air Marshal Christopher Nickols will take up the role of Acting Receiver General from the start of November.

This week, it has been a joy for me to get into the classroom to teach some lessons. On Monday I taught a lesson to all of our Form 4 pupils about stereotyping. We considered how our own internal biases can make us assume the gender of a person from a description where no gender is given, and we discussed how these biases can turn into prejudice and discrimination. We identified groups of people who may experience discrimination based on age, gender, disability, religion and race, amongst others and discussed how St Edmund's places a great emphasis on treating all people fairly and without prejudice. Yesterday, Mrs Ward and I taught a lesson to the Year 5 Experience Day pupils which I also teach to our own pupils based on the work of the Philosopher Thomas Hobbes and asking the question "What makes Me Me?" We used the dilemma of "The Ship of Theseus" to underpin our work and I was impressed and delighted by the comments that the children made.



New Website



We have been extremely excited to launch our new website this week. It has been a huge collaborative process involving staff from right across the school over a long period of time. We hope you like it too and would be very interested to hear your thoughts.

New Lighting Rig in the Theatre

Another exciting development this week has been the installation of a fabulous new lighting rig in the Theatre. This is a very significant investment which was funded by a former pupil of the school. Thanks to his extraordinary generosity we have replaced all of the old stage lights, some of which dated back to the 1940s, with a brand new remote operated LED Lighting, and state of the art stage management system. Not only will this greatly enhance the possibilities for future school productions, but it will also use significantly less power than its old-fashioned predecessor. Our Junior School pupils are incredibly fortunate to have access to such amazing facilities, and I can only apologise to parents for any increase in 'home performances' as the children get even more inspired to perform!

Auditions for the Junior School Production Take Place

Friday saw the auditions for the Junior School Production take place at lunchtime and after school. Yet again the Drama Department have been overwhelmed by the sheer number of children who have put themselves forward to be considered for a part in Alan Ayckbourn's "Ernie's Incredible Illucinations". I know they will be facing some difficult decisions over the weekend as they deliberate about who to cast. Please tell your children that we are extremely proud of them for putting themselves forward, regardless of whether they make it into the final production. If they are not successful this time they should not be disheartened, the Lower School Children will all be involved in the Christmas Nativity and all of the children will be involved in House Drama next term.

I was so impressed when I took part in their soup tasting session because all of the children ate their soup willingly, even though some of them were unused to the sensation of eating the spicy one, before giving each soup a mark out of 10. They even made some fresh wholemeal spelt bread to accompany the soup, and the children were able to add a garnish of pumpkin seeds and sunflower seeds if they wanted to do so. The children evaluated each soup according to taste, appearance, texture and smell then wrote their own recipes making sure that all commands started with an imperative verb!

School House Get Creative

It wasn't just Form 3 who got creative with pumpkins this week. Last night the children in School House including Kaden, Colour Sgt and Mrs French's son, spent some time carving their very own Halloween pumpkins. It was the first time that some of them had had a go at carving. Once we had finished, we put battery powered candles inside to light them up. Everyone was very pleased with the end results!

The Canterbury Festival Bursary Competition is a prestigious competition for outstanding young musicians living or studying in Kent, it takes place during the weeks of the Canterbury Festival. There are 2 categories, Junior, ages 12-14 and Senior, ages 15-18. In both categories 5 musicians are selected by audition to play at the competition each October. The senior competition has a prize of £2,000 for the winner who will also be an Ambassador for the year, leading workshops and other activities promoting Music and the Arts.

Auditions took place in June and we were delighted to hear that Jonathan Harris-Harding (F8), playing trumpet and his sister, Olivia (U5) on violin were among those selected to showcase Kent talent. I hear that they both gave wonderful performances.

Chorister Trip to the Philharmonia Orchestra at the Marlowe

On Wednesday 30th October the Choristers from the XVI visited the Marlowe Theatre to see the Philharmonia Orchestra. They played Sibelius Lemminkäinen's Return, Rachmaninov Piano Concerto No. 1 and Tchaikovsky Swan Lake (excerpts). As you can see, the boys had fantastic seats and greatly enjoyed scrutinising the musicians' performances.



Junior School ICT is ahead of the Curve!

A recent article in the TES (https://www.tes.com/news/how-teach-ai-and-machine-learning?fbclid=IwAR1HeeZdhxX12E_cqK3_SEpE2FdDHbDx16FtnjB1jS5cdLupOVn-ZcYEJ) discusses why schools should be teaching about Artificial Intelligence and machine learning. Form 8 have been doing exactly that when they have been working recently to learn about Alan Turing's "Turing Test" (or "Imitation Game" as I believe it was called in his paper in the 1950s). All classes in Form 8 have conducted their own Turing Test where they asked questions to two subjects and tried to see if they can tell which responses were answered by a machine and which ones were answered by human. They discussed what sort of questions could be asked and how these might be answered by AI. For example, members of each group established that a computer may answer a question concerning thoughts and feelings with a logical response. An example of this, a question that was asked "What do you think of Roald Dahl?" and they considered how they could make a machine response sound like it came from a human.

In addition, a discussion on data collection and how machines use this data has been taking place in Form 7, who have been working on creating databases recently. As part of their work, they touched on AI when looking at Ada Lovelace. They also discussed an article entitled "Amazon scraps secret AI recruiting tool that showed bias against women" that can be found here <https://www.reuters.com/article/us-amazon-com-jobs-automation-insight/amazon-scraps-secret-ai-recruiting-tool-that-showed-bias-against-women-idUSKCN1MK08G> in order to consider how gender bias can enter into people's thoughts about computing and careers in computing.



Exciting ICT Competition Opportunity for pupils in F3-6

Having announced the Open Coding Competition for pupils in Forms 7 & 8 in my last newsletter, an exciting opportunity has arisen for pupils in F3 to F6 to participate in their very own coding competition! The competition is international, involving other countries such as Nigeria and India. Pupils will complete challenges in a block programming environment very similar to "Scratch", a language which all St Edmund's pupils have already learned to code in. The biggest benefits for pupils entering the competition are; the development of problem solving skills in a competitive environment which will aid in the development of their individual resilience, and greater exposure to the sorts of skills that will be required in the future. We are especially excited at the prospect of getting through to the final to win one of the fantastic prizes which include tablets, programmable robots and books.
