# **Dragonflies**

The Dragonflies are learning about castles this week in preparation for our trip to Dover Castle on Tuesday. We have learnt about the features of castles - learning lots of new words like "ramparts", "portcullis", "arrow loops" and "keep" - as well as finding out about thrilling things like "dungeons", "drawbridges" and "murder holes"! We designed our own castles on the computers in our ICT lesson and have already started constructing the model castles in the classroom. We will be adding the finishing touches next week. Our castle work continued with a study of Paul Klee's "Castle and the Sun" - we were able to use our mathematical language to name the shapes and their properties, and then we created our own Castle and the Sun pictures. In Maths we were learning about Carroll diagrams and sorting shapes in a new and clever way.

We visited the Senior School Geography Department on Friday to find out the ideal site for a castle. Mrs Burton (Head of Geography) had "discovered" a box of toys - all the toys had a special requirement for their castle home - the My Little Pony wanted somewhere high up to feel the wind in her hair, the whale wanted to be near water and the Action Man wanted to be able to defend the castle from baddies. The class worked together to find the best location for the toy castle. It was tremendous fun and a wonderful way to learn geographical vocabulary.

### Crickets

The Crickets class pulled on their wellies and carried their clipboards, heading off to explore the school site at the beginning of the week. They looked at different types of trees and looked at the shapes, sizes and colours of different leaves. On their way, they spotted conkers and looked at the nature around the grounds. In the classroom, the children also used their mixing skills to make biscuits, which they all enjoyed eating together. Back in the classroom, they painted pictures of their walk using watercolours. Later in the week, as part of their topic work, they compared old and new parts of the school. Using History detective skills, they looked at features such as bricks, flooring and lighting. They also looked for signs with dates that may provide clues. In maths, the children have written number sentences using + and = and have used different words for those symbols. They have created pictures using 2D shapes. In literacy, the children have continued to sequence, write and recognise upper and lower case letters and made a class dictionary. In computing, the children are using more keys on the keyboard as well as improving their mouse skills. They have looked at famous people from the past and now and used a timeline to sequence how old they are.

### **Honey Bees**

Finding out about bees has been the focus for the Honey Bee Class this week! We began the week by learning about the life cycle of a bee and I was amazed that Joanna knew that they have hexagon shaped cells within the hive to live in. We therefore made our own hexagon shaped books about the life cycle of a bee for our topic work. The children had fun painting their own hexagon cells before making their own paper plate bee to live in it. On Wednesday the children were treated to a wonderful talk from the school's resident bee keeper Mr Jones, Head of Maths in the Senior school. He gave a magnificent presentation to the children all about how he looks after the bees in their hives and even brought a wooden cell from the hive complete with sticky wax cells for the children to see and touch. The children were enthralled to hear about his bees and asked very thoughtful questions when he put on his bee keeping gear. The children were treated to a sample of his own honey which was a very tasty treat. Thank you Mr Jones.



The children have found out how bees pollinate and carried out their own fun 'pollination' experiment using cheesy puff covered fingers and paper flowers. Great fun! We decided to make something with honey in it and the children decided on honey biscuits - they were very yummy!


Forest School was wonderful with the children using tools to hollow elder beads and thread them, along with imaginary play using the wooden logs as a boat.
