The Dragonflies had a wonderful trip to Dover Castle on Tuesday. The class met "Lady Eleanor de Monfort" - sister of the King of England and former owner of the castle. They were duly knighted and then explored the castle with her - learning all about life in medieval times. We then explored the castle once more, looking for all the defensive features that we had been learning about in class, and marking them off in our own I-Spy books.

We used our knowledge to add the final changes to our model castles back at school - working carefully to create moving drawbridges and portcullises; some even have spiral staircases and murder holes! Please come into the classroom to admire the finished castles.

Crickets

The Crickets have been busy thinking about Harvest this week. They created model tractors and combine harvesters with moving wheel, and then tasted harvest fruit milkshakes and smoothies. In maths, they have begun to recognise number bonds to 10 and used Numicon and multilink to solve number sentences. In their topic work, the children have learnt about famous people from the past such as St Augustine and Thomas Beckett. They used a video clip, drama and non-fiction texts to find out about their lives. On Thursday, the children excitedly set off down into Canterbury on a double decker bus. On the way, they identified landmarks such as the Westgate Towers, Canterbury Castle, the city walls and the Cathedral. The children walked towards the Buttermarket like the pilgrims would have done (but not on horses!). We were met by a guide, who led us to the doors and we went inside to explore the Cathedral. We saw religious artefacts such as the lectern, alter, crosses and font. We discovered where Thomas Beckett was murdered and looked around the Crypt.

We stopped off at Choir house for snack and headed off down the High Street where we popped into see Mr and Mrs Grimes who kindly welcomed us with treats. We then visited theBeaney museum where we looked at paintings by Sir Thomas Sidney Cooper. Back at Choir house, Mrs Stones kindly allowed us to eat our lunch where the choristers eat. Honey Bees

The Honey Bees have had a very busy week this week with their Magnificent Minibeasts topic focusing on snails. We began the week by finding out about snails, what habitat they like and how they move. We read Julia Donaldson's 'The Snail and the Whale' and wrote about where we would like the whale to take us. We then investigated the spiral pattern on snail shells and explored Henri Matisse' artwork The Snail before creating our own versions of it, using the same colours and copying the spiral pattern with cut paper.

On Tuesday we headed off for a wonderful day at Tyland Barn, Maidstone where we were undertaking a minibeast story day. The weather was very kind and we were able to enjoy the full day of activities in between showers! The children were thrilled with the minibeast work where they were introduced to the different habitats that various minibeasts like, before heading out for a fabulous hands on minibeast hunt. Digging in the compost bins for worms, searching under logs for woodlice, catching spiders, beetles and grasshoppers in bug pots to view were all carried out with great enthusiasm and interest from the children. We were then treated to table top pond dipping where the children were able to view close up newts, dragonfly larvae, water boatmen, pond spiders, water beetles and pond snails were found in abundance and the children were able to view them individually. The children demonstrated exemplary behaviour and it was lovely to hear the centre staff congratulate the children for their conduct during the day. Many thanks to the Kent Wildlife Trust for providing such a wonderful day.
