




#### Newsletter 4: 16th October 2020

## Message from Mr Comfort about Assessment

Our assessment and reporting systems are undergoing an exciting development this year, all to ensure that the level of teaching and learning is of the highest quality. For Forms 3 to 6, we have introduced termly standardised testing which will inform our teaching practice whilst also allowing for some extremely accurate and effective progress tracking of each individual student. For Forms 7 and 8, termly assessments will be created in conjunction with Senior School staff which will allow for GCSE skills to be assessed as part of our elite provision for these two year groups. In addition to these measures of progress tracking, we have introduced new baseline testing for both Lower and Upper school which will again inform our teacher's practice to ensure each individual achieves as highly as possible.

Our reporting cycle will also be amended this year given the continued disruption caused by Covid-19. By the time you read this, you would have already had parent-teacher meetings (via a phone call) with either your child's class teacher or form tutor which has hopefully given you an insight into their life at school thus far this academic year. Next half term, we will be issuing an Academic Review Card which will give you detailed information on your child's level of effort, attainment and individual progress. As a result of the production of this report, there will be no full written report this Michaelmas term. Next term, we will again produce an ARC report and run a full parents' evening (the details and logistics of which will be confirmed nearer the time).

Academic assessment aside, we have also been conscious of our students' well-being (now more than ever) and as such we ran some well-being surveys with our Lower School students and will soon be running these with the remainder of Upper School. The results of these surveys have been insightful and interesting and I thought it may be prudent to share some of our findings with you;

Overall, the general positivity of students is good - the sense of school belonging and the class climate were particular strong points in the eyes of the children

Self-efficacy was slightly lower than we had anticipated and, as such, staff will soon be implementing some strategies in class to help assist in its improvement

There was a very interesting relationship between intrinsic and extrinsic motivation which showed that students are more motivated to 'do well' as it was inherently satisfying and not simply to gain some form of praise/reward

Resilience and persistence scores were very encouraging- no surprise given the resilience shown by all during last term!

I will be holding meetings this week and next with some of our VAT (Very Able and Talented) students in Forms 7 and 8 to see, in their opinion, how we are currently stretching and challenging them and what more we could possibly offer them in the future to ensure we get the very best out of these gifted young learners- watch this space!

# Message from Mr Kincaid

It has been an exciting few weeks for Forms 7 and 8 in Outdoor Education lessons. We've had storms, rain and strong winds, and then more rain, and then brief sunny spells followed by even more rain. The pupils have been excellent, very enthusiastic and resilient in the face of challenging conditions. Form 7 have learnt the skills of fire making in tough damp conditions and everyone had a go at making some pancakes on an open fire. Although some of them had a slightly smoky taste, they were actually all very delicious! Extra thanks to the teams who made some for myself and Mr Jones, very much appreciated.

In Form 8 the focus had been on some bushcraft skills of rope/cord making out of stinging nettles and reeds. Some of the pupils were remarkably dextrous at this activity, with some making rope better than the teachers. We used this to create a tripod and will use these in the next session for boiling water and hopefully having some tea/hot chocolate.

Very excitingly over half term we have our giant tipi arriving in school (just in time for winter), this will give us a brilliant outdoor classroom and base for Outdoor Ed lessons. Please see the pictures on the next page...

#### Message from Mr Anderson

The Cardboard Boat Challenge tests your design, making and engineering skills to make a boat, no larger than a piece of A3 paper, out of cardboard. Your boat should be mostly made from cardboard but can include some other materials and it will need to keep a 500 gram weight afloat. Your finished product will be tested in school on Monday 2nd November, please make sure your boat is ready for testing in water. Points awarded for design style and total weight held in the water for 10 seconds. See poster.











# CARDBOARD BOAT New Deadline

Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November Meet 1pm in Room JSB

The brief: Construct a boat from cardboard.

#### The Specification:

The boat you design and make must Be able to support at least 250g Be made mostly from cardboard Be able to fit on an A3 piece of paper

**Top fips-** Back everything with wax paper or foil – be careful not to leave any gaps where the water can get in. Think about stability. Some shapes are more stable than others when a load is applied.





#### How does it work?

When a boot is placed in water, it displaces an amount of water equal to the boot's weight – as long as the object is less dense than the water, it will float.
