Summer Examinations

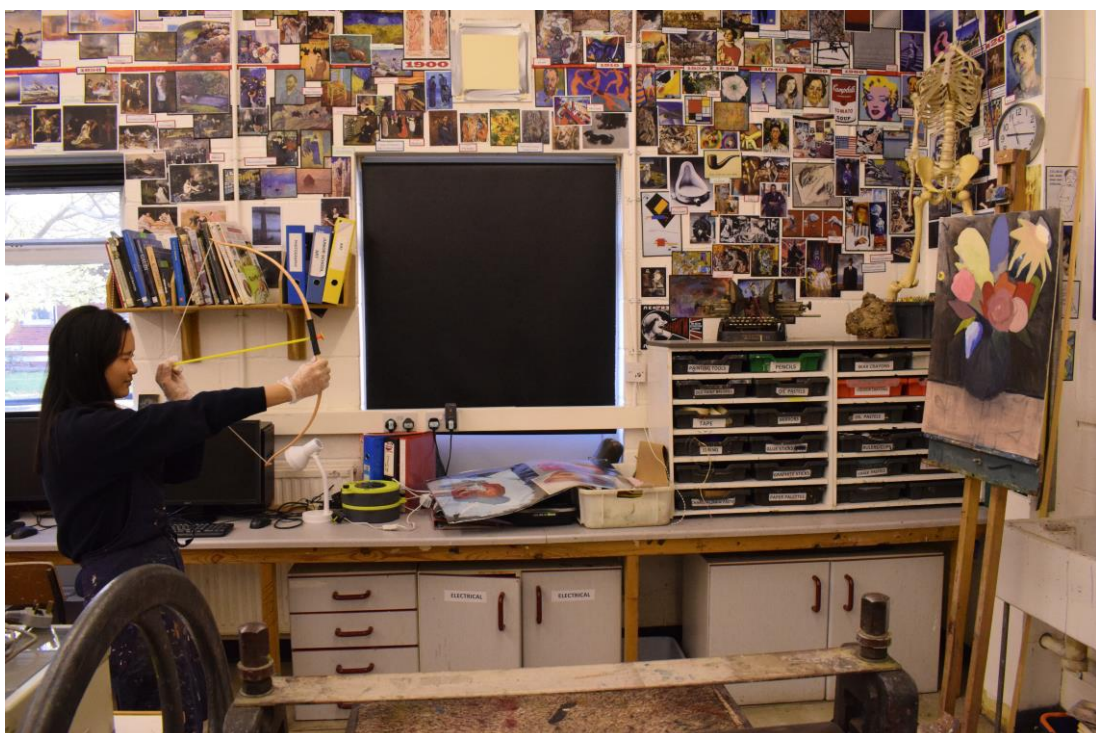
