# Assessment update Mr Comfort

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Assessment is a vital cog in education and we are working hard to develop and improve our procedures around both formative and summative assessment in the Junior School. These two forms of assessment, the former being the everyday assessing of classroom practice, live marking, verbal contributions and the like, and the latter tending to be the more formal end of topic/unit assessments, form part of the triangulation of evidence that staff use to ensure pupils are setted correctly and, importantly, are being sufficiently challenged in all of their lessons. As part of this continued dialogue around pupil progress, we have also commenced our termly pupil progress meetings wherein staff are invited to discuss a small group of pupils with myself where we analyse current attainment and progress and outline the next steps; the 'steps to success'. The effectiveness of these steps are then evaluated in the following meeting before a new group of pupils are discussed - ensuring we foster the continual reflective practice that is a key factor in effective teaching and learning.

We are also looking ahead to September and our new forms of data tracking systems which will further add to this ability to be reflective and identify areas for improvement and development, as well as our reporting systems and how we can best convey all of this information to you, as parents, in a concise, clear and meaningful fashion.
