On Friday, we welcomed Danny Dorling to the school to speak to our Sixth Form during their Skills and Service session. Danny is a statistician, Demographer, Social Scientist and (according to Mrs Burton) all round "Geography god", specialising in social injustice and inequality. Much of Danny's work has informed government policy in a number of spheres over a number of decades. He currently presides as Professor of Geography at Oxford University. Many of his books are required reading for our upcoming A-level Geographers, including 'Population 10 Billion' and 'Inequality and the 1%'. We are very grateful to him for taking to time to visit us in person and for giving our Geography society their very own question and answer session beforehand.



## L6 Film Studies presentation on early cinema and animation



### Eadweard Muybridge, 1830-1904 - life in motion

Rufus Filmer, Art teacher at St. Edmund's School, gave an insightful talk to L6 Film Studies pupils on Eadweard Muybridge - photographer, inventor, and early filmmaker. Pupils were introduced to Muybridge's contributions to cinematic history from his pioneering work on sequencing photographic images to provide the illusion of movement, to how Muybridge's early engineering influenced animators, and animation aesthetics, from Walt Disney to 'bullet time' in the Wachowskis' 1999 science fiction action hybrid 'The Matrix'. Pupils were also provided with the opportunity to create their own stop-motion animation task using their phone cameras, in addition to constructing a zoetrope.

As pupils start thinking about their own coursework (short filmmaking or screenwriting with a digital storyboard), Mr Filmer reminded them that careful sequences and pre-production planning is key to moving image success.
